Biographical Note

William Osborn Stoddard (1835-1925) was born in Homer, New York, the son of Sarah Ann Osborn and Prentice Samuel Stoddard, and grew up in Homer and Syracuse. He attended Rochester University before moving to Illinois in 1857 and received his B.A. in absentia in 1858. As editor of West Urbana's Republican newspaper, he began promoting Lincoln's presidential candidacy in 1859. After Lincoln was elected, Stoddard hoped his support might gain him a position on the president's staff. Instead he received an appointment as a clerk in the Interior Department. Some time later he was transferred to the White House as an assistant to the president's secretaries, John Nicolay and John Hay.

Lincoln appointed Stoddard United States Marshall for the Eastern District of Arkansas in 1864, with instructions—according to Stoddard, who held Radical views on Reconstruction policy—to assure suffrage for the freedmen. He soon concluded, however, that Union military weakness in Arkansas made a "healthy state government" impossible. Ill with malaria and dysentery, he resigned his post in 1866 and settled in New York City.

After leaving public service, Stoddard became a businessman, inventor, and writer. In all, he wrote over a hundred books for children and adults. His *Inside the White House in War Times* (1890) provides an insider's view of the wartime administration.

Scope and Content

The William O. Stoddard Collection was donated to Louis A. Warren Lincoln Library and Museum in 1988, with an addition in 2009, by Stoddard's granddaughter, Eleanor Stoddard of Chevy Chase, Maryland. It comprises the following items:

The document appointing Stoddard Marshall of the United States for the Eastern District of Arkansas; signed by Abraham Lincoln and William Henry Seward Foldered with oversize Lincoln autograph documents

6 photographs: 3 carte-de-visites of Stoddard (age 25, signed by Stoddard), Lincoln (inscribed on verso by Stoddard), and Mary Todd Lincoln; 3 cabinet cards of Mary Todd Lincoln (inscribed by Stoddard), Andrew Dickson White, and Stoddard (in 1911, signed by Stoddard)

Filed in Lincoln National Collection photographs; marked as Stoddard Collection

43 books: 42 written by Stoddard (see list below), 41 of which are inscribed and signed by him, and a copy of *Lincoln's Third Secretary: The Memoirs of William O. Stoddard*, edited and signed by William O. Stoddard, Jr.

Books about Lincoln are cataloged and shelved with Lincolniana; non-Lincoln books are uncataloged and boxed.

A 2-volume signed typescript of *Recollections of a Checkered Life*, Stoddard's autobiography written for his children in 1907. It is one of two existing copies bound for the Stoddard family and was donated by Eleanor Stoddard in 2009. *Cataloged and shelved with Lincolniana*

4 newspaper clippings on Stoddard and a photocopy of Stoddard's "Autobiographical Sketch" dated 1908
